Reflection: Old Truths That Never Grow Stale

One of the many strange things about church life is that the church is a community that keeps talking about the same things. Journalists are always looking for something new to put in the headlines. Scientists are constantly working to extend the boundaries of knowledge. Even friends depend on fresh stories to keep chit chat from growing stale. And then there is the church. Week after week, year after year, generation after generation — we keep talking about the same things. Show up on any given Sunday and you will hear a preacher in the front of the room commenting on sin, faith, grace, atonement, resurrection, and eternal life. Why do we do this?

The answer is given in I Corinthians 15:1. Paul begins the verse saying, 'I make known to you, brothers, the gospel which I preached to you'. Now it's worth pausing to think about what Paul means by 'making known'. The Corinthian Christians were not ignorant of the gospel. They had heard Paul preach many times before. They had also been reminded of the gospel several times in Paul's epistle already. So, then, what does Paul mean by saying that he is making the gospel *known* to them? The idea is not that he is presenting them with new information. Enlightenment is not the focus of the passage. Instead of revealing something new, Paul is reminding them of something old. Paul, the ever faithful pastor, knows that the most basic need of every Christian is not fresh insight, but a faithful memory. The key to abiding trust and unrelenting hope is not a hungry mind for new ideas, but a firm grasp on eternal truths.

Why is this? Why is it so important that pastors and preachers keep their congregations tethered to a handful of basic truths? Again, the answer is in I Corinthians 15. Moving on, Paul reminds the Corinthians that it was the gospel message that they both 'received' and on which they 'stand'. The latter verb is worth reflecting on more deeply. There are too many campfire talks that treat the gospel as if it is a magic formula. Many an evangelist has told a crowd that, if a person simply 'prays the prayer', he or she will be saved. At best, this is a half-truth. I Corinthians 15:1 tells us that the gospel is not just something to be believed ('received'), but something to *stand on*. In other words, for the Christian, the gospel is not an incantation that we repeat in order to be saved; the gospel is the ground which supports the entirety of our weight. Our whole existence is built on the death and resurrection of the Lord Jesus. Take that away from us and the world collapses beneath our feet. Believers do not just believe in the gospel. We live by the gospel; depend on the gospel; place all of our hope in the gospel. For us, the gospel is dearer to our souls than air, water, and sunlight are to our bodies. Paul makes this point explicitly in I Cor. 15:2 when he reminds the Corinthians that it is through the gospel that 'you are being saved'.

Here we can come full circle. We can now make better sense of why it is that the church keeps repeating old, familiar truths. We can also understand why, in the words of an old hymn, Christians never tire of hearing 'the old, old story'. On a long journey, fixed landmarks are always appreciated. No sailor tires of seeing the same old constellations that affirm that he is headed in the direction of a safe harbour. Something similar is true for us. Like the Israelites in exile, we live in a world in which there are few signs to indicate the kingdom of God on earth. We feel like foreigners who at best only partially fit into the social world around us. This experience can be disorienting. It can even be depressing. Therefore, what a joy it is to step back among God's people each week and to be reminded of familiar gospel truths, which, like signs along a road, tell us that we are headed in the direction of home.

The Summer Appeal 2022 - Now closed


