Reflection: Putting the pieces in place

"Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for, the conviction of things not seen." Hebrews 11:1

I wonder if you enjoy jigsaw puzzles. I have to admit that I don't particularly like them- I don't have the patience required! But my mother is a fan. When I visit, there is often a special mat on the dining room table with a partially finished puzzle that she gradually works on for days, if not weeks, until the picture is finished.

When I read the Bible, it seems to me that some of the stories are a bit like a jigsaw puzzle. God is slowly and steadily putting different pieces in place which will one day form a full picture. In fact you could say that the whole story of the Bible is like that as God puts together the pieces of His plan of salvation.

We find one such story in the book of Esther. The main action of the plot to destroy the Jews doesn't begin until into Chapter 3, but in Chapters 1 and 2 we see God (even though His name is never mentioned in the book) putting various pieces in place which will be essential to the final picture. For example:

- Queen Vashti refuses to obey the command of her husband, King Ahasuerus, to appear at his feast in Susa in Chapter 1. As a result, she is banished from his presence. This happens in the third year of King Ahasuerus's reign.
- Mordecai and Esther are two Jews living in Susa. For some reason they had decided not to return to Jerusalem at the end of the exile. Mordecai is descended from Kish, a Benjaminite.
- The King decides to hold a competition to find a replacement queen. Esther is one of those taken into the palace to take part. She finds favour with everyone involved, including the King, who decides to make her his Queen. This happens in the tenth month of the seventh year of his reign
- Mordecai then becomes aware of a plot on the King's life. He reports this to Esther who informs the King, and the plot is thwarted. Mordecai doesn't receive any honour for this at the time, but what he did is recorded in the King's book of chronicles, something which will be very important later in the story.
- The King promotes Haman to a position above all the other officials. Haman is an Agagite, a descendant of King Agag of the Amalekites, and an enemy of the Jews. In 1 Samuel 15, God had commanded King Saul to destroy Amalek and devote everyone and everything to destruction. Saul, however, disobeyed this command and spared King Agag and the best of the livestock. King Saul's father

- was Kish. Mordecai, descendant of Kish, refuses to bow to Haman, descendant of Agag, who then decides to seek his revenge.
- After nearly a year of casting lots, Haman approaches the King to destroy all Jews, and an edict to that effect is signed at the beginning of the thirteenth year of the King's reign.

Nearly ten years pass between the feast at the beginning of Chapter 1 and the edict at the end of Chapter 3. During that time, God has gradually been putting all of the pieces into place to enable victory over the plot to destroy the Jews.

When we read these stories, we do so with the benefit of hindsight. We know the picture that God is working on as He puts the different pieces in place over weeks, months, or even years. But the people at the time had no idea of the significance of what was happening. They didn't have that final picture. We might even think that some of the decisions people made were dubious ones: for example the decision of Mordecai and Esther not to return to Jerusalem, or the decision for Esther to participate in a competition which included spending a night with a pagan King. Yet through all of this, God was patiently working behind the scenes to put the necessary pieces in place.

Perhaps as you reflect back on your own life, you can see something similar. I know I certainly can in various events which have happened, not least in the way God put various pieces together in the years before David died, pieces which would turn out to be exactly what we needed when that time came. In the present, however, we don't usually have the big picture. It can be hard to understand why certain things are happening, or even to remember that there is a big picture. But recalling how God has worked in the past, whether in our lives or in the lives of others, gives us hope for the present and future. It helps us to trust that, even though we may not be able to see the big picture, the One who can is in control, patiently putting all the pieces in place.

Bethany Welcome Centre: an update and items needed



One of the many services Bethany Christian Trust offer is the Welcome Centre (previously known as the Bethany Shelter).

The Rapid Re-accommodation Welcome Centre provides emergency accommodation with support to anyone who would otherwise be rough sleeping in Edinburgh. Operating from a hotel October through to May, the Welcome Centre provides each individual or couple with their own bedroom and en-suite facilities. 24/7 care and support are provided by the professional Bethany staff, as well as specialised support from 26 visiting partners, with a focus on rapid re-accommodation. Each day there is breakfast, lunch and a hot nutritious evening meal provided by churches. (We are one of the churches providing these meals.) In the first four weeks of the 2022/2023 season, the Welcome Centre has supported 232 individuals who are experiencing homelessness.

Guests arrive at the Welcome Centre with many mental, physical and practical needs. The Bethany team have asked for help to provide the following practical items:

- Warm clothing jackets, jumpers, T-shirts (not shirts)
- New underwear and socks (we never have enough!)
- Trousers jeans, tracksuit bottoms (no suit/dress trousers)
- Hats & gloves (no scarves we always have too many)
- New travel size toiletries (soap, shower gel, shampoo, razors, moisturiser, lip balm, deodorant, packets of tissues)
- New toothbrushes and toothpaste

If you are able to provide any of these items- thank you! Please put them in the labelled box at the back of the church. The box will be available until **Sunday 18 December**. If you have any questions about items needed, contact Hannah Rankin (hannahlrankin@icloud.com).
