

Reflection: The Armour of God

"Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might. Put on the whole armour of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil." Ephesians 6:10–11 ESV

I've never been good at knowing my surroundings. I live in a huge city right on the edge of the Sahara. Twisting and turning in random patterns, it seems to never end. In a place with no addresses, who would be foolish enough to try and go places that are unfamiliar? Me. On my way back from the little local shop (that I actually knew my way to!) I decided that I wanted to take a different way home. One turn led to another turn until finally, I realized that I was quite lost...without water and without a phone. Smart!

Hot and tired, I miraculously made it back home. I realized I had neglected to equip myself with the proper tools for navigating an unpredictable climate. This is also the case as I walk out in my busy life. It can be easy to go about my work forgetting that I am in a spiritual war zone that is as dangerous and unpredictable as it is here. Paul, in his letter to the Ephesians, writes of a spiritual evil that we are combating against (Ephesians 6:12). Fortunately, he also writes of the tools we can use to fight. Verse 11 says, "Finally, be strong in the Lord and in the strength of his might. Put on the whole armour of God, that you may be able to stand against the schemes of the devil." This armour comes from God Himself. Walking out in life without it is like a soldier running into battle naked. Though foolish, I often find myself doing just that, which is forgetting that I have need for my Father.

How do we use this armour? We are told to be strong in the Lord. Like the Ark of the Covenant: Without the power of Jesus - we will fight a losing battle. This armour is to be put on daily as we combat the forces of evil. My mum always says that the enemy never takes a vacation: he is constantly seeking someone to devour. So, as we fight, we must know what we need. Paul gives us a list of the armour we can put on:

The Belt of Truth: A Roman soldier's belt kept the armour together and the sword secured. The entirety of God's word and Christ is truth. Without being centred on truth, the armour will be loose and no use. Only with this belt can we use the sword of the Spirit, which *is* God's word. If we can't trust Christ's words, then we would be like a ship without an anchor.

Breastplate of Righteousness: Our heart needs protection, for it's deceitfully wicked. If we don't understand what God requires, we'll listen to the voice saying, "follow your heart, it leads to instant gratification!" It's

a painful stab when one realizes too late that it's a lie. Righteousness fastened tightly with truth is believing Jesus paid it all. The breastplate we wear isn't ours, but His.

Peace Shoes: A soldier's shoes allowed him to plant his feet firmly in the ground, and to be ready for travel. Since the enemy plants many obstacles in our path, these shoes help us be prepared to go diligently to battle. As we proclaim the Good News of peace to the world, we must be confident in who we are in the One who guides our steps.

Shield of Faith: A soldier's shield wasn't just a defence, but a symbol of who it was they fought for. It put out fiery darts, and with the shields of others, formed a wall of protection. Faith is confidence in Christ. Satan will shoot arrows that slowly burn us with doubts and lies. When we raise up our shield, we declare that we are the Father's, whose promises are true. When we stand with others, we form a barrier of Christ that renders any attack powerless.

Helmet of Salvation: Signifying distinction and identity, Roman helmets protected the head. As Christians, our helmet also signifies this. Assurance of salvation is a hope in our identity in Christ. By daily latching on the helmet, we surrender to Christ, who renews our minds, rejects our doubts, and gives us an eternal perspective.

Sword of the Spirit: The sword of the Spirit is the word, double edged and powerful, scripture helps us fight the enemy's attacks. Just like a soldier trains when using a sword, we must train in the word and in the Spirit. Even a believer's heart is filled with many thorns that only this sword can cut down. As we go into battle everyday, we must keep alert with all perseverance, for our flesh is weak, but the Spirit is strong. Our hearts will be broken, we will have struggles, and it may seem hopeless at times, but Psalms 18:31-34 reminds us that in this battle we shouldn't give up, but place our hope in Him. It says this,

"For who is God, but the Lord? And who is a rock, except our God?— the God who equipped me with strength and made my way blameless. He made my feet like the feet of a deer and set me secure on the heights. He trains my hands for war, so that my arms can bend a bow of bronze."

I pray as we take up our cross, deny ourselves, and follow Christ into battle, we will put on the armour he gives us. Praise God that he has equipped us to not only fight, but to walk in freedom.

On Wednesday (27 September), Liam McArthur MSP will address (and answer questions at) a public forum at Barclay Viewforth Church, Edinburgh, alongside Dr Gillian Wright (director of Our Duty of Care) and Gordon MacDonald (for Care Not Killing). The event will take place from 7.30pm, tickets are free and can be booked here.

Gordon MacDonald writes 'we are glad of an opportunity to outline some of the bill's many <u>deficiencies</u>, as well as the broader, deeper, fundamental problems with legislating for assisted suicide. We'd love for you to join us there.'
