

Reflection: Everyone Struggles With Gratitude (Psalm 124)

Last week, I walked into our greenhouse, and I saw a cucumber and a tomato plant. The tomato plant was healthy, ready to burst forth with fruit, yet the cucumber was shrivelled, a victim to malnutrition. The image has stuck with me as I have been thinking about gratitude. Often, as I think about my heart, I feel like the cucumber plant. Although I want to be like the tomato, thriving with spiritual thankfulness, instead, my heart seems sapped of joy. Psalm 124 reminds me that this does not need to be the case. If I remember the right truth, the roots of my soul can be watered by the goodness of God.

To begin, Psalm 124 encourages me to think about what has not happened. The psalmist writes, "If it had not been the Lord who was on our side when people rose up against us, then they would have swallowed us up alive." For many, this sounds pointless. Why should we think about consequences that never existed? Its relevance, in part, comes from the fact that we are shortsighted in spotting reasons to be grateful. We limit ourselves to what we can see and what happens in the moment. Thus, thinking about what has not happened is an effective means to widen the radar of gratitude. Here is an example of this. Last April, my family and I were driving through the Cotswolds. As we approached a bend in the road, a lorry frantically swerved into our lane and barely missed us. Unfortunately, there was another lorry behind us which led to a head on collision. Looking back, it is scary to think about what could have happened. We easily could have been involved in a serious accident. Yet, although this is frightening, I am sincerely grateful that the Lord protected us in such a tangible way. The more I repeat to myself, "If it had not been the Lord who was on our side," the more grateful I feel.

A second way in which Psalm 124 equips me to be more grateful is in thinking about what has actually happened. The psalmist writes, "We have escaped like a bird from the snare of the fowlers; the snare is broken, and we have escaped!" Here, instead of contemplating "If it had not been the Lord who was on our side," I consider what is the case because the Lord is on my side. I often suffer from ingratitude because I take blessings for granted. One way to counteract this is counting simple blessings. My bedroom is a great example. I think about my desk, my comfy bed, the book I am reading, the fact that the room is tidy, my guitars, and, accordingly, I begin to feel grateful. I have been told that it is a good idea to list 30 reasons to be grateful every night. And I have found that this advice is soul nourishing. It is difficult at times to list 30 reasons, but as I work my way into the 20's, something extraordinary happens: gratitude spills over the banks of my heart.

Finally, Psalm 124 teaches me that the depths of gratitude are experienced not in reflecting in what God has done, but in who he is. The psalmist writes, "Our help is in the name of the Lord, who made heaven and earth." This is clearly exemplified in God's unwavering faithfulness to his people. As recorded in the Old Testament, Israel broke God's covenant countless times. They served other gods, and became like the surrounding pagan nations. Yet, God sent them judges. He even allowed them to have a King who would represent his cosmic Kingship on earth. For Israel, these blessings were undeserved. But, this is exactly why the Psalmist could rejoice. God is faithful, even when we are faithless! If you struggle with gratitude, meditate on the phrase "our help is in the name of the Lord." Like Christian in John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress*, we were stuck in the miry pit. Yet God set our feet on solid ground. Why did God do this? The answer is His character. The more we meditate on this character, the more gratitude we will feel.

Maybe you, like me, often feel like the withered cucumber in my greenhouse. If so, let me encourage you to read Psalm 124. This Psalm can help you cultivate thankfulness by directing your thoughts to three things: first, what would be the case apart from God's grace; second, what is the case because of God's grace; and finally, who God is for us.
