

# Reflection: The Need for New Home Groups

Here are some questions that I think about on a Monday morning: How do we shift from being a church of 100 to a church of 150? How do we make sure that longstanding members are looked after while new people are welcomed and integrated into the HEC community? How do we make sure that we continue to be an intergenerational church — not just a congregation where people of different ages attend — but a fellowship in which people of different ages interact and befriend each other? How do we make sure that the needs of members are known and cared for? How do we build a network of small groups that is sufficient to make room for all of the people coming into the congregation? How do we find contexts in which new believers are able to ask questions about the Bible without feeling ashamed by what they do not know or understand? How do we train up new leaders who feel competent to take on more responsibility in the church? This is the stuff that comes to my mind as I drink a first cup of coffee.

Now, a vital part of the answer to all of these questions is home groups. Home groups are one of the primary means we have to provide mutual care, to build new friendships, and to train up additional leaders. The stronger our home group ministry is, the healthier will be our discipleship, fellowship, and pastoral care. At the same time, if we are careless not to build a sufficient trellis for our home group ministry, the organic life of the church will eventually suffer as a consequence.

I mention all of this because we are in a season of needing to reorganise our home groups. I realise that, for some, this will be difficult news. One of the strengths of our current groups is the degree to which group members love each other. Many of us would happily live out several more years without feeling any desire for groups to be reshuffled. On the one hand, this is a reason to give thanks. As Ps. 133 says, it's a genuine blessing whenever brothers and sisters dwell together in unity. Yet, on the other, there is a potential danger in groups becoming too tight. Churches are open-door communities in which new people are constantly entering. A challenge facing any growing church is making sure that there is room for new faces to join settled groups of friends. If we are honest, a lot of our home groups do not currently have this capacity. What has happened over the last year or so is that a few groups have swelled in size while others have been stagnant. This is not a healthy model. If our congregation is indeed growing, this vitality should be feeding into all of our groups. We should all be experiencing the privilege of feeling engaged in the work of discipling and caring for the new members of our church family.

There are other difficulties in the current arrangement of home groups as well. A lot of our groups do not have a healthy mixture of ages and backgrounds. This cuts against the intent we have to be an

intergenerational church. Personally, I hope we forever resist the temptation to segment the congregation into silos of old, young, and whatever exists in-between. Just as the gospel eliminates the barrier between Jews and Greeks, so it also ought to remove the distance between teenager and retired. This means that all of our home groups should represent the beautiful mosaic of diversity that is the emerging Holyrood Evangelical Church.

And so, for these reasons and others, the session will be prayerfully preparing to relaunch new home groups in the Autumn. The plan will be to begin to draft new groups over the summer, to have a campaign in August and September to recruit new people to sign up to take part, and, finally, to launch the groups in October. It's worth mentioning here that this reorganisation of home groups will coincide with a change in our weekly schedule as a congregation. As of late Summer, we will be going back to a pattern of having a weekly Sunday evening service. This means that, when home groups restart, they will meet (in most cases) on Wednesday nights on rotation with the prayer meeting. The schedule will be the following: prayer meetings on the  $1^{st}$ ,  $3^{rd}$ , and  $5^{th}$  (when there is one) Wednesdays of the month; home groups on the  $2^{nd}$  and  $4^{th}$ .

I realise that there will be lots of questions in people's minds as they hear this news. My encouragement is for everyone to allow their minds to settle on one main question. It is this: How can I be prepared to join a new home group? In truth, a new home group is a new opportunity. It's a chance to draw close to new friends, to care for new needs, and to disciple new Christians. Let's not be afraid of such an opportunity. Instead, let's go into October believing that, if we expect great things, that God will do great things amongst us — not least within our home groups.
