Reflection: Life on a Floating Hospital

Catherine Brown flies out to Madagascar on 10th August to work as a theatre nurse on Mercy Ships. Here she shares with us a bit about how she got involved and what she'll be doing. She will be speaking at our prayer meeting on Wednesday 24th July. Save the date!

How did you first hear about Mercy Ships?

I'm a nurse, and I normally work in the operating theatres here in Edinburgh. Mercy Ships is a Christian charity which owns and runs hospital ships with operating theatres on board. At a Christian conference called Spring Harvest many years ago, I spotted a Mercy Ships poster advertising for theatre nurses. I was intrigued that I could use exactly the skills that I already had within an organisation like this. And so the seed was sewn. However, it took years for me to have the courage to apply.

Eventually, in 2008, I was on my way to Liberia to work on the ship. I loved the experience and returned to

volunteer year after year in my holidays. I've now been ten times, visiting Benin, Sierra Leone, Guinea, Togo, Cameroon and Senegal; some of these countries twice. My most recent trip was in 2022 when I flew out to join them in Senegal, West Africa, at the port of Dakar. My role was to be a team leader, looking after general surgical and gynaecology patients. I'm especially interested in helping women who've had childbirth injuries. This isn't something we normally see in the UK.



Do you actually live on the ship?

Yes, the Africa Mercy has accommodation for 400 crew and hospital beds for 76 patients. One of the challenges is sharing a cabin with strangers and climbing up and down from a top bunk in the dark! Most of the original cabins take 6 people. About half of the crew work in the hospital in various roles, and the other half keep the ship running by working as engineers, plumbers, cooks, housekeepers, chaplains and teachers. There's even a school on board called the Mercy Ships Academy, so families can bring their children. It's like having an entire village living together in one ship. You hear all the familiar sounds of children having piano lessons, coffee being made in the cafe, washing machines spinning. Meanwhile, down on deck 3, there's a state-of-the-art hospital, complete with CT scanner and five operating theatres.

What kind of surgeries does Mercy Ships do?

Mercy Ships is best known for its maxillofacial surgeries, thanks to Dr Gary Parker who has lived and worked on the ship for over 35 years. But we also do orthopaedics, plastic reconstructive surgery for patients with burns injuries, cataracts, dental surgery and so on. The scheduling is designed so that patients who will take longer to heal can have physiotherapy while the ship is still docked. Patients with cleft palates need speech therapy after their surgery. Often people imagine that the ship is constantly on the move, but we normally stay in one port for about 10 months of the year. This is important for following up patients, training our translators and building relationships.

Is there anything you find hard about being on the ship?

The lack of privacy can be a challenge, and saying goodbye to new friends every weekend is also difficult. But the hardest thing is knowing that there are still so many patients which Mercy Ships has to turn away each year. The need is so huge. However, we simply concentrate on trying to change lives, one patient at a time.

Why do you keep going back?

I love the team work on the ship. It really is a privilege to be part of such an international community. At any one time there will be volunteers from around 40 different countries. In a department such as the operating theatres, which has a very quick turnover of staff, it looks on paper as if it shouldn't be possible, but the Lord makes it happen. I've seen that when you need help, God will bring just the right person to work alongside you. Last year, I found Joshua 1:9 to be true, "Do not be afraid or discouraged. For the Lord your God will be with you wherever you go". We have great freedom on the ship to pray with patients and the staff really care for each other. I think it's good that everyone is a volunteer. It means that people are only on board because they've chosen to be there. I think it's as near to heaven as I'm going to find on earth.

What advice would you give to anyone thinking of finding out more?

We say, "Once a Mercy Shipper, always a Mercy Shipper." Those who've volunteered previously tend to look back and say that, for all the challenges, it was one of the best times in their life. Almost everyone has something to offer, from carpenters to bakers to hairdressers! If you can't volunteer yourself, please pray for our patients and consider spreading the word about Mercy Ships.
