Reflection: The Church as Christ's Church

From my kitchen window I look out on the front of a large and finely carved church building. It stands at the top of Easter road, its triangular spire topped by a greeny copper cross. It looks every inch the church, delicate crosses are inscribed above the doorway and a large cross with peeling paint is on the front gate.

For many in Scotland today this is all a church is: it's a building or a sort of religious public institution like a hospital or nursery. It might bury the dead and feed the poor and share optimistic stories of Jesus but there is nothing that is sacred, spiritual or even significant about it. In this common view of the church, the spiritual identity of the church isn't so much denied as ignored; it's not an anti-christian view of the church but instead a non-christian view of the church.

This unspiritual way of viewing the church does not stop at the gates of the church, it can begin to seep into our collective mind in the way that we talk, in the way that we spend our money and in the way that we worship. Certainly we would not say that our church is just a society or just a building, but we so often drift into patterns of behaviour which are not faithful to the bible's teaching of church. And it's not hard to see why, day to day our shared church life makes demands on our resources, our worship can feel repetitive and too often can personalities clash in church. It is when church is tiring and difficult that we retreat into a perspective of church which is comfortable and protects ourselves, a perspective which is unbiblical.

To recover a true vision of our church we need to hear again what God says about the church in His bible; seeing by eyes of faith. Looking at the church without a biblical viewpoint would be rather like receiving a present of jewellery but only admiring the small velvet box it comes in. The beauty is inside and we have to see it to value it!

Much could be said about the church of Christ, about its victory, its fruitbearing, its salvation and its beauty. That we as the church are promised the gift of the comforting and guiding Holy Spirit. That we as the church are the delight of Christ. That we as the church will endure till the end.

But the starting point and finishing point of all thinking about the church must and can only be that the church is united to Christ. That is to say He is our head and we are His body. How often do we think of Holyrood Evangelical Church as Christ's dearly loved church? How often do we remember that Christ died for those who sit in the services alongside us? Is it easy for us to think of each other as brothers and sisters in the Lord?

Everyday we must commit to seeing the church in the way that the bible describes it, commit to thinking God's thoughts after Him.

HEC's 10th Birthday




The summer appeal final total came to **£13086** and has been distributed to our missionaries as follows:
