Reflection: Rejoicing in the Blessing of Covenant Baptism

The session has recently started a book, *Covenant Baptism* by Jason Helopoulos. This is part of an effort to retain - and rejoice in - a significant aspect of our church identity. At Holyrood, we baptise infants not due to tradition, but due to a particular understanding of God's relationship to His people. We believe that baptism is much more than a sign of a personal profession of faith. Baptism calls attention to God's covenant promises to His people. Since Abraham, God has declared that His covenant love extends through multiple generations. He is not just the God of Abraham himself, but also the God of Issac, Jacob, and of all of the spiritual children that come after.

Now, it would be wonderful to see a recovery of covenant baptism across the wider congregation. For some, this theology will be excitingly new. For others, it will be a matter of reburnishing something perhaps not put to use for a long time. Either way, we would all benefit from embracing anew the promises of God and seeing more deeply the way in which baptism is a visible sign of God's relationship to us in Christ.

In order to help us think about this topic, I've included below two links for talks available on YouTube on the topic of covenant baptism. One is by Dr. Ligon Duncan, an old friend of the congregation. The other is an interview with Jason Helopoulos, whose book the session is currently reading. Both are edifying and insightful.

Let me offer some advice as we venture together into the deep waters of covenant theology. First, it's important to know that the Bible is not a box of separate pearls. This is how a lot of people read it. We imagine that particular verses are disconnected from each other. One effect of this misunderstanding is that we often try to formulate our theology on various issues by means of using "proof-texts". We look for single verses that prove a point.

There is a better way of reading the Bible. The pearls that are found in the Bible (and there are countless) are meant to be threaded together as a neckless. Thus, interpreting the Bible is a matter of both understanding isolated statements, but also of stringing them together into something holistic and beautiful.

Covenant is the word for the thread that holds the Bible together. If you want to see the big picture of what God is communicating through the Bible, then covenant theology needs to be a topic of focused study.

But, second, let me warn you that thinking about covenant baptism will feel like going uphill for modern Christians. This is the case for a couple of reasons. On the one hand, individualism is ingrained in our worldview. This can hinder our ability to understand the Bible's teaching on baptism. We naturally think that baptism is mainly about *me*. That's not the case. Baptism is most importantly about God, secondly about the church, and thirdly about the individual. To get the order of priority wrong is to miss the meaning of the sacrament.

On the other hand, modern people care way too much about experience. This often means that we prioritise the experience of baptism over the truth of baptism. The more dramatic the occasion of baptism is for the individual, the more we like the method being used. We want baptism to be an unforgettable event like getting married or having a child.

No doubt, for many, baptism will indeed be unforgettable. Still, it's important to know that the truth of baptism matters more than the experience of baptism. Here marriage provides an analogy. A lot of people today overthink the event of marriage and underthink the meaning of marriage. They spend thousands of pounds on creating the most special day imaginable without reflecting much at all about nature of the bond resulting from the marriage ceremony.

We can make a similar mistake with baptism. The most important aspect of baptism is not the experience of the sacrament, but the truth of the sacrament. Baptism is a sign and seal of the covenant union between Christ and His people. This union is what we need to focus the most attention on as we observe baptisms in the church.

Keeping this in mind, take some time this week to explore the wonderful truths of covenant baptism. Doing this will not just be an investment in your own relationship with God; it will be an investment in our church family as a whole.
